I found him very receptive to listening and he said he had spoken to a number of residents who had all voiced the same concerns surrounding the lack of a service, particularly Ogle where there is nothing at the moment.

Mr.Morris MP has written a very long letter to Mr.Stuart McNaughton, Head of Strategic Transport and Climate Change at Northumberland County Council expressing his concern at the lack of a service. He sent me a copy and said he would update me when he receives a reply. So I will let you know any outome in due course.

I have not included his letter to the council in this newsletter as I'm aware it does not apply to everyone on the distribution list, but if anyone would like to see a copy of the letter he sent to the Council, please let me know as he is happy for me to share it.




News from Belsay Primary School

Belsay School is back in full swing after a wonderful summer break and the children have returned brimming with enthusiasm for the new academic year. We are delighted to welcome our brand-new Reception class, as well as six new starters across the school, all of whom have settled in beautifully.

We began the term with great energy, as some of our Year 5 and 6 boys took part in a Trust-wide football tournament, competing against other primary schools in the Pele Trust. We are very proud of their efforts and look forward to celebrating our girls' tournament in the coming weeks.

Our Reception Class teacher, Miss Houghton, has been thrilled with how confidently our youngest children have embraced school life. To start things off the children are focusing on the important theme of emotions. To support their learning, they are using the much-loved book The Colour



Monster, which will help them better understand feelings and how to express them.



In Maple Class, our Year 1 and 2 children have been journeying into space, learning fascinating facts about our solar system. Perhaps we have some future astronauts among us! Both Maple and Willow Classes are also looking forward to a joint class trip to the Centre for Life in Newcastle, where they will explore current exhibits on seasonal change and enjoy the spectacular Living in Space exhibition. We can't wait to hear

all about their discoveries.

In Alder Class, pupils are delving into the world of the Anglo-Saxons. Mrs Aynsley has lots of creative ideas up her sleeve, so we may see some wonderful (and possibly very messy!) art projects inspired by this fascinating period of history.
