What did history ever do for us? By Paul Stott – Organist at Hartburn

We are blessed in the Benefice with some rich history in the church buildings and their stories and legends. Researching those histories can be highly rewarding: start with a look at John Hodgson's *History of Northumberland, Volume 2* (available in the Lit & Phil), a visit to the archive at Woodhorn to view any records or past research that may have already been written, and perhaps consult more modern sources, such as *Reading the Fabric* by Peter Ryder. But, beware! Expect contradictions and inconsistencies and expect to go in circles. Just when you think you have got a clear view, something will turn up to upend that view and you will have to carry on burrowing. A visit to *Archaeologia Aeliana*, the archive of the Society of Antiquaries of Newcastle upon Tyne, can be very beneficial: if it is of interest to you, there is a good chance that somebody has researched it before you. But remember, above all, that serendipity is always important in research: look for the "angels" who are often present in archives and libraries – helpers that know their way around and who can save you a lot of time and point you to sources you might not have considered.

St Andrews, Hartburn, has around 900 years of recorded history with relics relating to the Norman conquest, the Crusades, witch trials, the Civil War, Waterloo and plenty more. We are fortunate to have prior research (a booklet on the history published by Canon Ferg Donnelly, vicar of St Andrews 1965 to 1983, and a previous version written by Canon RC MacLeod, Rural Dean of Morpeth 1910 to 1928), which gave a flying start and pointed to some interesting lines of enquiry – but they also raised many questions: who were the occupants of the De Wotton chantry (incorrectly recorded in the prior research as the Long Witton Chantry)?; who were the skeletons in the tower?; what is the real meaning of the crosses carved in the porch and on the door frame?; why did John Sharp create the grotto in Hartburn Dene?

Researching that history has become something of an obsession. The Knights Templar was the first rabbit hole I ventured down (those crosses on the door post), taking me, inter alia, to the Temple Church in London and into contact with the incumbent *Valiant Master of the Temple*. Research can be a lot of fun! How often do you get to meet some with the title *Valiant Master*?

The latest rabbit hole has been the world of John Sharp DD, our vicar between 1749 and 1792. I had a head start on that one too, through the book *The Good Sharps* by Hester Grant: the story of an astonishing family from Rothbury whose portrait hangs in the National Gallery, and of which John Sharp was the first born. My view of the grotto in Hartburn Dene quickly changed from it being the whim of a wealthy 18th C. vicar with too much time on his hands, to a project of a significant philanthropist who used his personal wealth, as his father had done before him in creating the Sharp Tower, a folly in Rothbury, to make work for under-employed labour. Re-distribution of wealth in a very practical way.

John Sharp is now predominantly celebrated for his work at Bamburgh Castle, undertaken in his role as the Perpetual Curate of Bamburgh. The role centred on marshalling the significant financial resources of the Lord Crew Charity for good works — including establishment of a hospital, a school, a home for the destitute, the world's first lifeboat and a store for circumventing the hardships of the corn law. My interest was more prosaic, however. The Sharp siblings were accomplished musicians, forming a sort of 18th C. Osmond Family who can be seen, with their instruments, in Johann Zoffany's portrait in the National Gallery. They played for George III on their barge on the Thames and Johann Christian Bach was a personal friend. The Sharps were instrumental in bringing Handel's music to the North-East, specifically to Durham, Handel's work being effectively vetoed in Newcastle by Charles Avison, because he disagreed with sacred music being performed in concert halls. My initial idea was to try to organise a concert to celebrate the Sharps' musical activities.

Contact with the Lord Crewe Charity took me to the musty archives of Durham Cathedral library to view the Sharp Music Archive. I got to look at the Sharps' music, which was in itself a thrill, but what I came away with was a new rabbit hole to go down, largely due to one of those "angels". As I was about to leave, having looked at what I thought I wanted to see, a librarian said: "we also have these". What the librarian directed me to was two boxes containing John Sharp's handwritten sermons. It is exciting enough to be looking at the personal hand and thoughts of someone from 250 years ago but in the top of the first box was a scribbled note from a previous researcher: "The slavery sermon is number 3".

What had the Sharps to do with slavery? The youngest of the siblings, Granville Sharp, is now the most famous: known by the epithet "the father of abolition". Granville appears to have been a little odd: possibly neuro-divergent in some way and, initially, appeared to be destined to be the least successful of the brothers. An encounter with a 16 year-old slave boy in London, however, changed that destiny in a very significant way. The story is too long to recount here (you can read it in the St Andrews History section of the Benefice web site), but it has a plot worthy of a Dickens novel or a major motion picture. The Sharp brothers rescued Jonathan Strong, who had been beaten almost to death by his owner and turned out into the street to die. They brought him back to health and found him a new free life in London only for him to be kidnapped by his former owner and re-sold and imprisoned to await a ship to transport him to Jamaica. Against all odds, Granville used the law to rescue Jonathan Strong and subsequently to take on the entire slave-owning establishment to outlaw slavery on British soil. No lawyer would take on the cause, because it appeared hopeless, so Granville, a draper by training, taught himself the law and took a case before the Lord Chancellor, which he won: slavery was not a status compatible with Common Law.

Granville then set about working for the abolition of the slave trade: the first step on the road to full abolition. With his friend Thomas Clarkson he established the Society for the Purpose of Effecting the Abolition of the Slave Trade in 1787, with members including William Wilberforce and Josiah Wedgewood. The Society needed money and set about raising the modern equivalent of £350,000 in very short order. Older brother John used his influence in Northumberland, Durham and Cambridge to support the cause and to raise significant funds. He did this by preaching a very effective anti-slavery sermon throughout

the region in 1788 and 1789. The words are magnificent and make arresting reading: you can read them for yourself on the web site: it is well worth the effort to do so. In our parishes he preached the sermon:

- In Hartburn on March 16th 1788;
- In Meldon on April 6th 1788;
- In Bolam on April 13th 1788;
- In Mitford on April 27th 1788;
- In Netherwitton on May 23rd 1788.

And, so, to the point of this essay. At one level, research into the history of our buildings is a trivial pursuit. It gives me a lot of fun and interest. At another level, however, it can be a resource to add richness to our communities. I am hoping that the churches listed above, along with all the other churches in our region where the cause was preached, can use the sermon in some way to celebrate a connection with which we in Northumberland should be very proud. In Hartburn we are planning a festival this October to include a lecture from Hester Grant, author of *The Good Sharps*, a concert of early music and an 18th Century evensong to hear John Sharp's words read to us from the pulpit. The evensong will be sung in St Andrews by Newcastle Cathedral Choir and the event will raise money for the Oswin Project - a cause that I am sure the Sharp family would have wholeheartedly supported.

The Roost – Nurturing Spirituality and Wellbeing with Young Adults in Northumberland

Eight years ago, a small group of Christian young adults met together for the first time in Morpeth to talk about life & faith & hopes & challenges of living in Northumberland and being 18-30 ish. We had dinner, pondered a short passage from the bible, had some quiet space to pray and to reflect, and decided that we'd like to do it again. And again.

In the years that followed we enjoyed camping retreats in a field & hiring village halls for evenings of worship & creative prayer. We began work in a local 6th form, formed friendships and got to know other young adults. Here we are now, registered as a charity with a base in Netherwitton, and reaching out across Northumberland. We are 'The Roost' - our name says what our hope is; that anyone who comes across us would find 'a place of rest to help them fly.'

There are 3 strands to what we do; we have a community at the heart of the charity which explores contemplative Christian spirituality - it's primarily for young adults but all ages are welcome. We gather each month in person, and in between times online. We also have smaller groups meeting to explore life & faith, and days dotted throughout the year like retreats, and pilgrimage. We serve as chaplains to 6th formers in schools, and have a big dream to serve in all of them across the region. And we have a half-acre outdoor space in Netherwitton that we've cultivated to be a community garden with a cabin. People come here to switch off, get muddy, cook by the fire and experience the beauty, the wild & the healing that can come through spending time in the natural world.

Being a young adult (16 - 35 ish!) isn't easy and there is so much to navigate, and although living rurally is beautiful, it can be difficult to meet people, hard to get around, and getting access to services such as mental health support is really tough. Our hope is to be a presence for all young adults here - creating safe spaces, indoors & out, where they will find love and support, whoever they are.

The story of Jesus walking alongside the two on the Emmaus Road is a constant inspiration to us - He came alongside, gently stirred their hearts, waited for their invitation and then revealed who He was. We are privileged in our work to span the breadth of the encounter we see here - offering spaces of gentle listening, as well as spaces for prayer & worship.

If you would like to hear more do get in touch. We often experience people saying that they just feel drawn to The Roost - and then they become a precious part of us. Check out our website, follow our instagram, sign up to our newsletter & come over to the cabin for a cuppa. And if you do know of young adults whose home is Northumberland point them to us - we'd love to meet them!


News from Belsay Primary School Cont.

Learning in Class 1

As part of their History topic, they have been learning about Rosa Parks and were very shocked about the way she was treated.

In Design and Technology, the children are looking forward to creating a masterpiece (a kebab/plate design/smoothie) with fruit. Before this can happen though, they need to plan what they will make and what utensils they will need; along with designing their product for an intended consumer. Learning in Class 2

This half term in Art, the children are enjoying learning about Kehinde Wiley and how he changes the narrative of portraits by European Old Masters and medieval Christian icons, by including figures of black men and women that he enrols from the street. His art draws attention to the lack of diversity seen historically and also references bright and bold backgrounds.
