## Message from the Ministry Team By Pam Walker

The Coronation of King Charles III has taken place. A ceremony steeped in history with much symbolism was tied up in the regalia used.

Here I will mention some of it, remembering that nearly all needed to be remade for King Charles II's coronation in 1661, after the originals had been melted down or broken up in 1649. All that remains from the first set is the Anointing Spoon. It acts as a bridge to ancient items, which were regarded as relics of St Edward as well as coronation ornaments.

And St Edward's Crown is indeed named after Edward the confessor. The cross at the top signifying we are all subject to a higher authority.

The King was also presented with two sceptres.

The Sovereign's Sceptre with Cross represents temporal power and the rod of equity and peace is surmounted by a dove representing the Holy Spirit

The Orb is probably an elaborated form of the Greek akakia. Which was as a cylindrical purple silk roll containing dust, held by the Byzantine emperors during ceremonies, and symbolizing the mortal nature of all men. Nevertheless, it represents the Sovereign's power, under the cross, under Christ, and it symbolises the Christian world, with its cross mounted on a globe, and the bands of jewels dividing it up into three sections represent the three continents known in medieval times.

There are five Swords borne and used during the Coronation rite. They have chivalric overtones, but their use certainly dates from before the Conquest, to pre-Christian Saxon rites.

Four are carried before the monarch into the Abbey: The Sword of State, which is used for other subsequent occasions during the Monarch's reign, notably the State Opening of Parliament; the blunt Sword of Mercy the Sword of Spiritual Justice; and the Sword of Temporal Justice. The final sword.

All weapons of war whose purpose has been subverted to emphasise God's peace, mercy, justice, and goodness.

Finally, the Jewelled Sword of Offering, made in 1821 for the Coronation of George IV, was accompanied by this prayer

"Receive this Kingly Sword. May it be to you, and to all who witness these things, a sign and symbol not of judgement, but of justice; not of might, but of mercy..."

## Message from the Ministry Team By Pam Walker cont.

"With this sword do justice, stop the growth of iniquity, protect the holy Church of God and all people of goodwill, help and defend widows and orphans, restore the things that gone to decay, maintain the things that are restored, punish and reform what is amiss, and confirm what is in good order...,

These, the very words associated with the regalia used in the coronation, peace, justice, mercy, equity, are those that model Kingship on the life of Christ, the King of Kings, to whose authority we all subject and whom we are called to model ourselves.




# Whalton Coronation Party



#### Whalton celebrates the Coronation of King Charles III Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> May 2023

To mark this auspicious occasion, Whalton held a day full of events. It began with a family service in St Mary Magdalene's Church with the congregation processing to the Village Hall after the service for a blessing and prayer led by Rev. Elaine.





The children had made crowns at School the previous Thursday and came dressed in coronation colours too for competitions that included Best Crown and Best Dressed in Red, White and Blue. Lady Renwick presented them all with Coronation medals and they processed round and round the grass at the front. We were so lucky to have lovely weather.

It was then into the Hall to find places for lunch. Women of Whalton WI had made a fabulous array of table requisites and decorations including specially wrapped 'favours', painted bottles, and 'stained glass' paper crowns and King Charles' Coronation emblem on the windows. Whalton Primary school children had made some very lovely white paper bunting using their handprints in blue or red paint strung on red and blue ribbon. Children at P.A.W.S. had made pom poms, and



Whalton Gardening Club provided vases of fresh red, white and blue flowers.



Jim Grant told stories of Kings and Queens and then lunch of Coronation Chicken, generously provided by the Beresford Arms, was served with salad and baked potatoes. Donations of trifles and other puddings completed a delicious lunch.

The storyteller continued to entertain the children and then the Bubble Whisperer arrived. Originally intended as fun for the children, his bubbles were so multitudinous, extraordinary,

and magnificent in the sun on the outside terrace, that a great many adults joined the fun out there.

Coronation Cake, a concoction of lemon sponge decorated with the Union Jack made from piped cream, raspberries,



and blueberries, was cut by Dame Margaret Barbour; Sir Richard Renwick proposed the Loyal Toast to King Charles III, and everyone sang a hearty rendition of the National Anthem.

There was a very well supported



raffle and the opportunity to purchase special souvenir tea towels. Each child at Whalton School had drawn a picture of King Charles III which had been printed onto cotton with the Coronation emblem (see picture). There are still a few of these to purchase if you would like to own this unique souvenir.


